PHASE ONE OF ROOF REPAIRS AT SXM TERMINAL BUILDING COMPLETED

The Managing Board of the Princess Juliana International Airport — SXM announced the completion of Phase One of the roof repair project at the Terminal Building. The project originally began in March 2018. The completion of this phase is another step towards the reconstruction of the entire Terminal Building, the Managing Board said.

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According to the Projects, Planning and Systems Department of SXM Airport (PPS), the 250 meters long roof, covering almost 16,000 square meters, was severely damaged in the aftermath of the September 2017 hurricanes. Hurricane Irma had ripped off 70% of the Terminal Building's roof.

Leakage consequently became a grave concern which effectively closed down the building's operational status. The Ballast Nedam company was contracted to reconstruct the roof in the first phase. The repairs included steel deck treatment, installation of the flat metal sheets and water-

proofing.

The Managing Board has confirmed that the roof repair plan will be carried out in three phases. Phase 2 of the project has already begun and includes the installation of the roof profiles and panels. Meanwhile, phase 3 will include the installation of the bullnoses and soffits, which form the perimeter of the roof.

The newly completed roof works (Phase 1) will ensure that the terminal will be watertight. Only after the installation of the roof profiles, panels, bullnoses and soffits (Phase 2+3 works) will the entire roof be able to sustain hurricane wind force of 185 miles per hour (Category 5). The overall project is set to be completed in November 2018.

EMERGENCY OPERATIONS CENTER (EOC)

On Sunday, July 8, the Emergency Operations Center (EOC) continued to monitor closely the progress of Tropical Storm Beryl. All ten Emergency Support Functions of the country's disaster management system as well as supporting entities such as the Marines continued to make preparations related to the storm. The ten Emergency Support Functions comprises of GEBE, Telecommunications, Police, Fire, Communications, Tourism, Social & Welfare Affairs, Public Health, and Ministry VROMI (Public Works). Director of the STB May-Ling Chun during her presentation said that the organization of the Forum came at a crucial time. "... Weather is changing quickly on us and these Category 5 or other natural disasters for that matter no longer are once in a blue moon. Reality is we have to be ready for them."

Weever and the team of the Emergency Support Function (ESF) on Saturday July 7, 2018.

The emergency meeting convened to discuss the necessary hurricane precautionary measures and

the joint efforts of key entities. During the SXM Airport Hurricane team meeting later that morning, Joseph Isaac of the Meteorological Department of St. Maarten divulged that approximately 11:00am, Beryl was downgraded to a tropical storm, and expected to degenerate once it approaches the Lesser Antilles. The island expected maximum wind speeds less than 30 to 35 miles per hour (mph).

The Hurricane Team was also prepared to secure both the Pavilions and the terminal building in light of the storm system.

with her views on how the operation should be run. Her no-nonsense approach is equally met with grace, as she is intensely passionate about the industry.


Overview of some of Ariana's accomplishments:

The Princess Juliana International Airport, SXM, met with the Transportation Security Administration (TSA) at the Carl's and Sons Inn and Conference center. The purpose of the meeting was to discuss the aviation security screening requirements as it relates to US Pre-Clearance. TSA gave information about the proposed US Pre-Clearance and the specifications required for this.

The SXM Airport delegation-was also given further details about the relevant aviation requirements. TSA gave a presentation related to the U.S. Pre-Clearance, specifically regarding the TSA Memorandum of Cooperation (MOC), TSA Aviation Security (AVSEC) requirements, and a summary of equipment and screening technologies.

TSA also determined if SXM Airport's equipment were certified or qualified. During the walk-through they also checked the bottled liquid

CARIBBEAN AVIATION DAY

Chief Financial Officer (CFO) and Acting Chief Executive Officer (CEO), Ravi Daryanani of the Princess Juliana International Airport — SXM — was among panelists at the recently concluded Caribbean Aviation Day hosted by the International Air Transportation Association (IATA), the Caribbean Development Bank and ALTA, at the Hilton Barbados Resort.

The "Executive CEO Chat" addressed the theme: "Challenges facing the Caribbean Aviation Growth and Intra-Connectivity."

The other panelists included the CEO of LIAT, Julie Reifer -Jones, Managing Director of Bahamasair, Tracy Cooper, Secretary General of the Caribbean Tourism Organization, Hugh Riley and Media Consultant of Rogers Media House, Julian Rogers. The chat is a traditional flagship panel at IATA Aviation Days, bringing senior executives of the aviation industry together to discuss some of the challenges that the industry has faced over the past year and is likely to face in coming years.

The overall goal of the panel was to get the panelists in terms to shed light on how they have

met or plan to meet those challenges.

Reportedly, the air transport industry in Latin America and the Caribbean generates US\$ 167 billion in GDP and supports 5.2 million jobs. The report, according to IATA, goes on to state that every year, 2.6 million flights operate in Latin America and the Caribbean, connecting 385 cities in the region and 160 cities around the world. Daryanani took the opportunity to update the panelists and delegates on the current operations at the Princess Juliana International Airport following the 2017 hurricanes.

"Maybe Hurricane Irma did one thing for us, it allowed us to hit a reset button on how to reach out to our airlines, VIP services, partners and neighbors on the French side," he said.

He further revealed that a Memorandum of Understanding has been signed between the authorities of Dutch and French St. Martin, forging a bond for both sides to work together in efforts to market the island as one destination.
